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Emmerdale's Matt Healy launches LSC North West Learner Awards 2008 in Greater Manchester

More 40 business and education leaders gathered in Manchester yesterday to hear how they can nominate apprentices, employers and learners from across Greater Manchester for the prestigious Learning and Skills Council's (LSC) North West Learner Awards.

Matt Healy, who plays Matthew King in ITV's Emmerdale, launched the Greater Manchester round of the Awards at the Bridgewater Hall yesterday. Matt, who was born and raised in Oldham and attended Salford University College in the early nineties, said he was thrilled to be taking part in the awards as he had seen first hand the difference recognition can make. "My father won an Apprenticeship competition when he was working as an apprentice riveter in the shipyard at Port Glasgow, which changed the course of his life," he told the audience. "As a direct result of that award, he was able to go on to college and learn computer science, which gave him the opportunity to embark on a much more successful career. That was all because someone saw something in him and gave him a chance. It's great to give prizes and make people feel appreciated, so please, nominate your apprentices and help them with the applications, and help them achieve their goals."

Christine Troughton, Partnership Director, LSC Greater Manchester, said; "These awards are critical in highlighting the hard work of our young learners, the quality of the training provision you deliver, and the important part played by employers. They are a fantastic

opportunity to applaud apprentices who are taking their future in their hands, and also employers who are taking control of the future of their business by investing in the skills of their workforce. Training and skills development are very rewarding in themselves but in many cases that achievement represents considerable sacrifice and resilience in adversity. These awards are an opportunity to celebrate achievement, both for the individual and others involved and to raise awareness and offer inspiration to others.”

Employers, learning providers and apprentices from around Greater Manchester are being urged to nominate individuals and companies for the six award categories, which are Apprentice of the Year, Young Apprentice of the Year, Personal Achiever of the Year, Employer of the Year, Further Education Vocational Learner of the Year and Further Education Academic Learner of the Year.

The awards cover the North West LSC’s five sub-regions – Cheshire and Warrington, Cumbria, Greater Manchester, Greater Merseyside and Lancashire.

Each of the sub-regions will host their own round of the awards, which recognise and reward excellence in learning, skills and achievement in individuals and organisations in their area. They also develop links between local businesses and learning providers.

The North West Learner Awards are held in conjunction with the LSC National Apprenticeship Awards. Now in their fifth year, the National Apprenticeship Awards recognise and reward both employers and apprentices who are successfully using Apprenticeships. This could be to improve their business performance and tackle skills shortages; where a contribution to the workplace has exceeded employers’ expectations and resulted in measurable benefits; or for individuals who have overcome difficulties to succeed through their Apprenticeship.

The quality of entries to the National Apprenticeship Awards, from both employers and apprentices, has been outstanding, with over 1,100 entries received in 2007 alone.

The winners in each of the categories from the sub-regions of the North West Regional Awards will go on to compete for the North West Regional Award in their category and could then be short listed for the National Apprenticeship Awards final, which will be held at the Royal Horticultural Halls in London on Thursday 10 July 2008.
